Provincial funding freeze thaws; ESP gets \$1.1 million this year

The Province of Manitoba has announced an additional \$47 million in funding to municipalities and for the RM of East St. Paul that means just over \$1.1 million added to the 2023 budget.

The RM received just over \$670,000 in provincial funding last year.

Mayor Carla Devlin says the increase comes at a perfect time for all municipalities.

"It's no secret the last few years have been challenging," Devlin said.

"The global economy is down and inflation is up. Ending the seven year freeze now is critical for municipalities who haven't just been dealing with these issues today, but for several years. We applaud Premier Stefanson's move."

Premier Heather Stefanson and Municipal Relations Minister Andrew Smith made the announcement.

"Our government is listening. We are taking action and getting things done for the benefit of all Manitobans," said Stefanson. "We recognize municipalities and communities across our province are facing significant pressures that impact the ability to deliver important projects and services Manitobans rely and depend on. This additional \$47 million in unconditional funding will support municipal budgets for the 2023 fiscal year and beyond, and we are pleased to provide this much-needed certainty, now."

The increase brings to a close

a seven-year freeze on provincial funding and the move earned praise from the Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM).

"As inflation has significantly impacted municipal budgets and municipalities are not permitted to run deficits, this historic municipal funding announcement will help local councils respond to current financial pressures, build stronger communities and finalize local budgets with certainty."

Reminder - do the right thing, pick up your dog's poop

Dog owners are reminded that picking up after your dog isn't just the courteous thing to do, it's the law.

The RM's Animal Control Officers have received numerous complaints about the amount of dog feces being left along the Duff Roblin Parkway Trail north of Garven Road.

It's unsightly and unsanitary - imagine stepping on a pile of poop unknowingly and then spreading it everywhere with every step, your car and your house – and it's also against the law.

The RM's By-Law 2022-11, Section 3.1 (d) states:

No person shall permit a dog to:

defecate on property (d) other than the owner's without immediately removing the excrement and disposing of it in a sanitary manner.

The fine for your dog pooping and you not scooping is \$268.

Please have consideration for your neighbours and pick up your dog's business everywhere in the municipality.

Low to moderate risk for spring flooding, province says

In its February Spring Flood Outlook, Manitoba Infrastructure and Transportation's Hydrologic Forecast Centre says there is a low to moderate risk of flooding in most areas of the province.

It's early so the Outlook says weather conditions from now until spring melt will determine the actual flood risk.

As of early March, the risk along the Red River in the Interlake region is moderate.

The Province, along with Winnipeg Environmental Remediations Inc., (WERI) is conducting normal spring ice-cutting and breaking to reduce ice-jam related flooding. Ice cutting is expect-

Spring road restrictions are important

The RM implements Spring Road Restrictions every year to limit the allowable weight a heavy truck can carry on Municipal roadways. Generally, restrictions are in effect from early March until late May. This is all weather dependant and the RM follows the Provincial recommendations for start and end

dates.

All municipal roads are classified as Class B roadways with a maximum weight rating of 20,000kgs. There are many East St. Paul roads that are designated as no truck routes, including Wenzel. The complete listing of roadways is available in the annual Spring Road Restriction Notice the RM issues.

During spring thaw, no truck routes are posted at 65 per cent of normal axle loads to limit the weight commercial trucks can carry on roadways and avoid serious damage to the surface and base layers of the road. The exception is Hoddinott Road, which is restricted to 90 per cent

of normal axle loads.

Infrastructure repairs, such as damaged roads, are paid for through tax dollars. Restricting overweight trucks helps save East St. Paul roads and taxpayer dollars. Roadways are especially susceptible to damage during

In 2022, 91,190 reports of fraud were made in Canada. In the first month of 2023, 6,610 reports were made;

There were 57,055 victims of fraud last year and 3,923 by Jan. 31st of this year;

\$531 million was lost to fraud last year and already in 2023 \$43.6 million has been lost.

Authorities say these numbers are low, as many people don't report fraud.

Even though we're coming through a relatively easy winter it's still nice to see the warmer and brighter weather of spring. In particular, the stretching out of the daylight hours is most noticeable and welcome. Daylight hours are at minimum at the winter solstice around Dec. 21st and increase daily until maximum around June 21st. The dayto-day increase is not constant, starting and ending at zero, with the maximum occurring at the spring equinox around March 21st making the season most enjoyable.

A major event for our community this past winter was the recent Provincial Scotties hosted by our own East St. Paul Curling Club. By all accounts it was a smashing success, a tribute to the Club, the Curl Manitoba organization, and all the local volunteers.

In the recent half dozen years or so, the Club has served as home for several national and world ranked women's teams including Kerri Einarson, Tracy Fleury, and most recently the Walter foursome. Major competitions are televised, and the home clubs are frequently mentioned throughout telecasts with East St. Paul becoming well known nationally in the curling community.

We are keeping an eye on developments of a major project near Vivian in the RM of Springfield. Located there is a huge underground deposit of superior quality silica sand, a valuable material used for the manufacture of high tech products in the glass, electronics, batteries and solar panel industries. A company called Sio Silica has applied for approval to establish mining extraction and surface processing facilities at the site. As aquifer



water is involved in the process there is concern over possible detrimental effects of well water in the area. Although we are some distance away it is well known aquifers flow from east to west which is why we have a vested interest in the developments. A well organized and active Springfield citizens group is in strong opposition to the project, which is currently undergoing the necessary reviews and public hearings by the provincial Clean Environment Commission.

The latest Provincial flood forecast is for light to moderate risk of flooding this spring. Forecasting considers factors such as snow cover, soil saturation, frost depth, long range weather predictions, etc. This is certainly welcome news considering the problems of last year.

Finally, I thank all residents who voted in last fall's Municipal election. Exercising the democratic right to choose is essential to strong and fair governance. It's my privilege to serve the community as councillor and while we have our challenges, I find it extremely rewarding and interesting.
