Important changes to TIPPS

Effective Jan. 1 roperty owners participating in the Municipality's TIPPS program would have seen their payment amounts lowered over the course of 2024 due to changes by the Province of Manitoba during the tax year and it's expected there will be further impacts to TIPPS in 2025. The Province changed the Manitoba School Tax Rebate during 2024 and approved the rebate to be added directly to the 2024 annual property tax bill instead of issuing a cheque. Adding the rebate directly to the tax bill meant lower TIPPS payments for property owners in the program from August to December of 2024, as the full Manitoba School Tax Rebate was applied to these five monthly TIPPS payments.

their TIPPS payments change in 2025 with the implementation of the Homeowners Affordability Tax Credit, which replaces the Manitoba School Tax Rebate and the Education Property Tax Credit Advance. This new tax credit will provide eligible property owners a credit of up to \$1,500 on their annual property tax bill. Most property owners will see an increase to their TIPPS payments as of January 2025 to reflect the new tax credit on the upcoming year applied over 12 months. Property owners should expect to see a measurable increase to their January 2025 payment instalment compared to their December 2024 payment.

RM provides safe buy & sell space

he RM is pleased to announce the establishment of a Buy and Sell Safe Exchange

Zone in the parking lot of the RM of East St. Paul Administration Building. This designated area is monitored by security cameras and is located near the RCMP office, providing an additional layer of safety for all residents involved in buy-and-sell transactions

To ensure your safety, we recommend following these important tips when meeting for exchanges:

• Complete transactions during daylight hours and in a public space. If the other party refuses to meet at this location, it may be a red flag.

• Do not meet someone alone. Always have a friend or family member accompany you.

• Never share your banking or personal information.


• Take screenshots of all transactions and conversations as a record.

• Bring only enough cash to cover the cost of the item being purchased.

• Always trust your instincts. If something doesn't feel right, walk away and contact authorities.

Additionally, please note that only legal transactions are permitted at the Buy and Sell Exchange Zone. Transactions involving weapons, firearms, or other illegal products or services will not be allowed. The RCMP and Community Safety Officers will not facilitate or conduct exchanges on your behalf. The RM of East St. Paul accepts no responsibility for any transactions that occur within the Buy and Sell Safe Exchange Zone.

We hope this initiative helps make your buying and selling experiences safer and more secure. Thank you for being proactive in keeping our community safe.

Stay off the ice

he East St. Paul Emergency Preparedness Committee along with the East St. Paul Fire Department would like to advise all residents to stay off ponds, lagoons, creeks and especially the Red River.

Although we are currently in a cold snap weather wise, we had a fairly warm fall and early winter. As a result, it is unknown how thick the ice is in various locations.

Even though it may appear that ponds, lagoons etc. have a solid ice cover, you do not know what lies underneath.

The Red River is still open in some areas and should be avoided. Venturing out on the ice also puts emergency responders in dangerous situations should they receive a call.

Parents are asked to remind their children to stay off the ice. If walking a pet near ice, make sure it is on a leash to prevent it from running onto the surface.

If you see someone on the ice, especially the Red River, call 911.

years before.

Mom Sarah Fill says her in-laws home was destroyed by fire when Blake and his younger brother Troy were quite young, but they definitely remember it.

"My kids saw what that was like and what happened," she said.

"The house was gone, they remember the rebuilding of the house. They were little when it happened, but it wasn't just something that lasted five minutes and was fixed, it was years to rebuild and get back to the place they were. We always instilled the importance of that in our kids."

When the school newsletter came home and including information on the Fire Prevention poster contest, Sarah was excited.

"I thought it would be a cool thing for them to do, not just to

make the plan but so that we actually have this plan if something were to happen. So Blake was all over it," she said.

And when he won, well that was exciting too.


"He was very excited when he came home from school that day," she said.
